Lucy Daniels Center views a child's behavior as a communication of need, and equips parents to understand and respond to those needs in a meaningful way. We help families find ways to alleviate the every day struggles while also addressing the root cause of the issues, allowing long-term change and healing to take place.

OUR APPROACH: Wraparound Care

Through our wraparound care model, Lucy Daniels Center staff works as a team to keep our families and children at the center of our mission. Our **therapists**, **teachers**, and **psychiatrists** collaborate to provide the best possible care experience for families and diligently partner with **parents** to help their children better understand themselves. And through **financial aid** opportunities made possible by your generosity and our community outreach services, we can ensure that more families have access to the care their children need.







21.8% of children

have one or more common mental, emotional, or behavioral health conditions making them more likely to drop out of school, struggle to earn a living wage, or have trouble with the law as adults.



40% high school graduation rate

for students with emotional, behavioral, and mental health disorders. The national average student graduation rate is 76%.



Most adults with mental health issues

had a previous psychiatric disorder during childhood. Studies show that multidisciplinary early intervention is key to mitigating negative outcomes.




Every year approximately 20%

of high school students report seriously contemplating suicide. 10-24 year olds account for 14% of all suicides, and it is the eighth leading cause of death among 5 to 11 year olds.



39.6% unemployment rate in adults with mental illness, compared to the national unemployment

in adults with mental illness, compared to the national unemployment rate of around 3.8%. Un- and under-employment has an impact of over \$193 billion dollars on the economy every year - Improving mental health through early intervention can make such a difference to this number.



37% of people in prison

have a history of mental health problems. On average, states spend more than \$45,000 per prisoner each year they are incarcerated - investing in people before they reach crisis is more cost effective in the long term and better for both the individual and society as a whole.

WHY EARLY INTERVENTION?

It's a long-term investment:


Costs associated with mental health challenges are astronomical - over \$300 Billion every year - but we can change that. Investing in mental health supports today will place our society on a different path where our children, parents, teachers and other community leaders are set up for success. Improving mental health across the population will:

- Reduce suicide rates;
- Reduce rates of incarceration and institutionalization;
- Increase earning potential for individuals and families;
- Reduce the strain on healthcare and social services.

Most mental health challenges that affect adults can be identified during childhood:

So many individuals suffer with mental health challenges over time and only receive support and treatment if or when they hit a crisis point. As with all health issues, the longer an illness has to take hold, the harder it is to treat or mitigate. The earlier we can provide treatment, the better the long-term outcome.

When we give children the tools and resources they need as they learn and grow, we create happy, healthy adults who are ready to be the leaders, parents, and community members that our society needs to thrive for generations to come.
